To Protect & Serve

The **Campus Police Department (Hinds CC PD)** is a team of law enforcement professionals working to provide a secure environment in which the educational mission of the college can be fully realized. The officers and staff are service-oriented and committed to the safety and well-being of those associated with Hinds Community College.

The Hinds CC PD is a full-service law enforcement agency, providing services during hours of operation on the Raymond, Utica, Jackson, Nursing Allied and Rankin campuses. The Hinds CC PD also oversees supplemental contract security operations on the Vicksburg campus. The Hinds CC PD provides crime prevention and control, criminal investigation, traffic and parking supervision, disaster coordination maintenance of public order.

Our Officers and Their Training

Campus security is provided by state-certified police officers supplemented with contract security officers.

- Police officers are certified by the State of Mississippi Board of Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Training and are sworn Peace Officers.
- Campus Police officers receive basic law enforcement training at a state-certified training academy and all receive continuous in-service training in law enforcement and human services.
- Security officers, although without police power, are able to enforce college rules and regulations.

Officers provide the following additional services to all students, faculty, staff and visitors:

- Assist the Emergency Operations Manager in providing emergency notifications and timely warnings through the ***Hinds Alert app*** as well as Hinds Insider emails.
- Maintain the college lost-and-found service.
- Provide safety escorts to your vehicle or building.
- Provide safety awareness and crime prevention training.
- Provide physical security assessments.
- Issue vehicle parking decals.

Campus Security Measures

Hinds Community College operates under an “Open Campus” policy, but there are specific security measures regarding access to campus buildings and events.

- **Identification cards with proper validation are issued to all students and employees and must be visibly worn AT ALL TIMES when on campus.**
- Failure to visibly wear one’s I.D. card at all times when on college property can result in fines and disciplinary action, including suspension from Hinds CC. The I.D. card must be surrendered to any college official upon request.
- Exterior entrances to residence halls, academic, technical, career and athletic facilities are routinely and regularly patrolled and secured by the Campus Police/Security officers. Additionally, Campus Police/Security officers provide routine and regular foot and/or vehicular patrol of the college.
- Private business or solicitation may not be conducted on college premises, including residence halls and/or academic buildings, except when a student organization has requested a particular service which is directly relevant to the purpose of that organization and has been given approval by the appropriate college officials.

All campuses are closed to all unauthorized personnel from 12:00 a.m. until 7 a.m. each night.

Crime Prevention Tips

- **Do not leave your belongings unattended in study areas, classrooms, public spaces, etc.**
- **Do not leave your valuables in plain view.**
 - Do not leave them in your vehicle. If you must, place them in your trunk or out of view.
- **Lock your door before you leave.**
 - Lock your dorm, car, office, classroom, etc., even if you will just be gone for a minute.
- **Never leave your car unattended while it is running and ALWAYS take your key/fob with you.**
- **Be aware of your surroundings. If you see something suspicious report it to Campus Police.**
 - Do not walk alone or with headphones in/on both ears.
 - Call Campus Police for an escort to your vehicle or building if you need one.

Weapons Prohibited

Hinds CC PD is committed to maintaining a safe and secure environment supporting Hinds CC's mission. **The possession, use and/or threatened use of any firearm or other weapon (e.g., mace, knives, etc.) on or in any Hinds CC campus or facility by anyone other than duly authorized law enforcement officials, institutional security personnel or other authorized persons is strictly prohibited.**

Drug & Alcohol-Free Campuses

In compliance with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 and the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989, Hinds CC maintains a drug-free campus for all Hinds CC employees and students and prohibits the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of illicit drugs or alcohol on its campuses or as a part of any Hinds CC activity. Hinds CC PD strictly enforces laws restricting the use of illegal drugs. The unlawful use or possession of drugs may result in conduct action by Hinds CC, as well as criminal charges and legal penalties.

The college forbids the possession and/or consumption of alcoholic beverages or drugs on the campus and/or at any activity sponsored by a student organization at the college on college owned or controlled property. Drunkenness or evidence of intoxication is a violation of law on college property. Drunkenness can be caused by alcohol, drugs, narcotics, or other intoxicating substances.

1. The student's parents or legal guardian will be called to come and take custody of the student (if the student is under the age of 21);
2. If the parent or legal guardian cannot be contacted, or if the parent or legal guardian refuses or is unable to take custody of the student within one and a half hours, then the student may be arrested and transported to jail.

The Hinds CC counseling staff provide free counseling for all enrolled students, faculty and staff. Additionally, alcohol and drug abuse prevention education programs are offered in collaboration with Student Services and the Campus Police Department. As always, be on the lookout for various awareness week events offered district wide throughout the school year.

Hinds CC has contracted with Pathways Counseling Center to have confidential counseling services made available for any special needs a student or employee may have. Pathways Counseling Center will provide immediate, confidential, and effective assistance and is available to Hinds students and employees at no charge for short term counseling. Residence Hall Safety

Important Information

Staff

Trained Hall Directors and Resident Assistants staff the halls and are on call 24 hours a day.

They also are assigned to the desk in the lobby during certain hours.

Access

All exterior doors are locked at 11 p.m. and reopen at 1 p.m. when staff are on duty.

Residents are issued a key to **their assigned hall and room only**.

Guests

Visitation is limited to **1 p.m. - 11 p.m. Sunday -Thursday** and **1 p.m. - 11:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday**.

Visitors must sign in and are required to present a valid picture I.D.

Opposite sex guests are restricted to the lobby of the residence hall.

Same-sex overnight guests are permitted only on Friday or Saturday nights when approved by the Hall Director.

Residential Campus Safety & Security Programs

Currently, the college has a multi-faceted program to inform students and employees of campus security procedures and crime prevention.

- Throughout the school year, the Hinds CC PD, Student Services and other college departments utilize printed materials, student forums, special emphasis week programs and multi-media presentations to promote crime prevention and awareness in the college community.
- Residence Life staff offers many different programs that address all facets of life such as interpersonal relationships, improving study skills, time and stress management, self-defense, rape prevention and sexual-health education.

Missing Students

Hinds CC maintains a missing student notification policy for students who reside in on-campus housing. This procedure applies to students who reside on campus who have been deemed missing or absent from the College for a period of more than 24 hours without any known reason or which may be contrary to usual patterns of behavior. Such circumstances could include, but are not limited to:

- Reports or suspicions of foul play.
- Suicidal thoughts.
- Known or suspect drug use.
- Any life-threatening situations.
- Known to be with persons who may endanger the welfare of the student.

All reports of missing resident students shall be directed to the Campus Police Department, the Dean of Students, the Director of Housing, or the Office of the President. If a missing student is under 18 years of age, the college is required to notify the parent or guardian no later than 24 hours from the time the student was determined to be missing by the college. Campus Police will also notify other law enforcement agencies if deemed necessary after the student is determined to be missing.

All residential students will have the opportunity to designate an individual or individuals to be emergency contacts, who will be notified by the college no more than 24 hours from the time the student is determined to be missing. All confidential emergency contact information will be on file with Housing and Residence Life and will remain in effect until changed or revoked by the student.

Sex Offender Registry

The Federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community where to obtain state law enforcement agency information regarding registered sex offenders. The act also requires sex offenders, who must register in the state, to provide notice as required by law, to each institution of higher education where the person is employed, carries on vacations, volunteers, or is a student. Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act (VAWA)

In alignment with the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act, Hinds CC prohibits dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking. Hinds CC offers several educational awareness and prevention programs to help combat and prevent dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

Title IX Information

The Campus Sexual Violence Elimination (SaVE) Act

The Campus Sexual Violence Elimination (SaVE) Act increases transparency on campus about incidents of sexual violence. It guarantees victims' enhanced rights, sets standards for disciplinary proceedings, and requires campus-wide prevention education programs. The Campus SaVE Act amends the Clery Act, which addresses campus sexual assault policies within the Higher Education Act of 1965. President Barack Obama signed the SaVE Act into law on March 7, 2013, as part of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Reauthorization.

The Campus SaVE Act amends the Clery Act, which requires campuses to provide annual statistics on incidents of campus crimes, including sexual assaults occurring on campus, and report to campus authorities or local police. The Campus SaVE Act broadens this requirement to mandate more robust reporting of sexual violence, including domestic violence incidents, dating violence, and stalking.

Title IX

Hinds CC is committed to fostering a respectful, safe, and non-threatening environment for its students and employees. This policy describes prohibited conduct and establishes procedures for responding to sexual misconduct incidents. These incidents include sexual assault, sexual harassment, and other unwelcome behaviors, as explained below. Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 prohibits discrimination based on sex in education programs and activities.

Definition of Sexual Harassment or Misconduct

Sexual harassment is a broad, non-legal term used to refer to a wide range of non-consensual and unwelcomed behaviors that are sexual in nature. The Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) and the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) regard sexual harassment as an unlawful and discriminatory practice.

Sexual harassment/misconduct can occur between strangers, acquaintances, or persons in intimate relationships. It can occur between people of the same or different genders.

Sexual/Gender-Based Harassment: Unwelcome conduct determined by a reasonable person to be so objectively offensive, pervasive, and severe that it effectively denies a person equal access to the ability to participate in or to benefit from the university's educational or work programs. To constitute harassment, the conduct must be such that it has the effect of unreasonably interfering with the student's academic performance or creating an intimidating, hostile, demeaning, or offensive academic or work environment.

Quid Pro Quo: When a subordinate suffers a tangible adverse action due to their refusal or unwillingness to submit to a higher-up's sexual demands.

Title IX Information

The Title IX Coordinator oversees policies and procedures that apply to complaints or reports of sexual misconduct by students, staff, or third parties and advises victims of sexual misconduct of their right to file a complaint or seek an informal resolution and the process each. Responsibilities performed in this policy by the Title IX Coordinator may be performed by the Title IX Coordinator or by another Hinds CC employee trained by and acting under the Title IX Coordinator's supervision.

Retaliation against someone who reports sexual or gender-based harassment is strictly prohibited at Hinds CC and should be reported to the Title IX coordinator. All reports of sexual harassment and retaliation will be investigated promptly by the Title IX coordinator and/or Human Resources.

Students or employees who believe they have been a victim of sexual misconduct may submit a complaint against the accused in writing or person to the Title IX Coordinator, DeAndre House, Vice President of Student Services/Title IX Coordinator, Denton Hall (Raymond Campus), call 601-857-3889 or email: titleix@hindscc.edu.

Jeanne Clery Act

Pursuant to 20 United States Code section 1092(f), the "Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act," and the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) requires that each institution of higher education in the United States, which participates in federal student aid programs must produce and distribute an annual report containing crime statistics and statements of security policy. Failure to provide required information or including inaccurate information may result in fines imposed by the U.S. Department of Education (DOE).

The Clery Act – Legal Requirements

- Publish an annual report every year by October 1st that contains three (3) years' worth of crime statistics and certain security policy statements, including sexual assault policies.
- Make a good faith effort to disclose crime statistics for the campus, unobstructed public areas immediately adjacent to or running through the campus, and certain non-campus facilities, including off-site Hinds CC-owned/operated property.
- Provide "timely warning" notices of those crimes that have occurred on or near campus and pose an "ongoing threat to students and employees."
- Disclose in a public daily crime log any crime that occurred on campus or within Hinds CC PD's patrol jurisdiction and was reported to Hinds CC PD.

Definitions of Clery Geography

On-Campus – On-campus is defined as (1) any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used by the institution in direct support of or in a manner related to the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls and (2) any building or property that is within or reasonably contiguous to the area identified in paragraph 1 that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is frequently used by students, and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or retail vendor).

On-Campus Housing – Any student housing facility that is owned/controlled by Hinds CC, or is located on property that is owned/controlled by Hinds CC, and is within the reasonably contiguous geographic area that makes up the campus.

Non-Campus Building or Property – A non-campus building or property is defined as (1) any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution or (2) any building or property owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support of or in relation to the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.

Public Property – Public property is defined as all property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities, that is within the campus or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus.



Reporting Clery Act Crimes

Reporting to Other Campus Security Authorities (CSAs)

Ideally, all crimes will be reported directly and promptly to the Hinds CC Campus Police but we recognize that some may prefer to report incidents to other college offices or individuals. The Clery Act requires Hinds CC to disclose statistics of certain crimes that occur within Hinds Clery geography and that are reported to designated Campus Security Authorities (CSAs).

This term, CSA, is a Clery Act-specific term defined as an official of an institution who has significant responsibility for student and campus activities and who has the authority and the duty to act and/or respond to particular issues on behalf of the institution. This includes:

- All members of Hinds CC PD,
- Faculty advisors of student groups,
- Student Affairs staff, and
- Deans or Assistant Deans.

CSAs can help facilitate notification of Hinds CC PD on the victim's behalf if the victim so desires. Remember, prompt and accurate reporting is essential in helping law enforcement to bring justice to the victim.

Per Clery Act guidance, professional counselors and pastoral care personnel whom Hinds hires to serve in counseling are not considered a CSA when acting in that role. They should attempt to regularly inform those they counsel of the voluntary and confidential reporting options available to them.

Confidential Reporting

If you are the victim of a crime and wish for your identity to remain confidential and do not wish to pursue any criminal investigations, you must let the CSA to whom you reported the incident know. If confidentiality has been requested, the CSA will gather the necessary information and immediately notify Hinds CC PD to implement the appropriate crime alerts, if warranted, when the safety of the campus as a whole may be at risk. CSAs should also notify Hinds CC PD of the nature and location of the incident so the incident can be included in the statistical records to comply with the Clery Act. Reporting Dating/Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault, or Stalking to Police

Hinds CC encourages accurate and prompt reporting of all crimes to Campus Police and local law enforcement, if appropriate, when the victim elects to, or is unable to, make such a report.

Although Hinds CC strongly encourages all members of its community to report violations to law enforcement, it is the individual's choice whether or not to make such a report and the individual has the right to decline involvement with the law enforcement. If the individual chooses to report the matter to law enforcement, Hinds CC employees shall provide assistance to the individual. Hinds CC retains the right to notify law enforcement authorities and may engage in appropriate investigatory processes when concerns exist for conduct threatening the personal safety of an individual or the wellbeing of the Hinds CC community, with or without the individual's participation.

Reports may be made to Campus Police by calling 601-857-3911, in person at any Hinds CC Campus Police office or online at <http://forms.hindscc.edu/CampusPolice/Default.aspx>. Reports may be made simultaneously to law enforcement and the Title IX Coordinator. When there are concurrent reports the Title IX Coordinator and the investigating law enforcement agency will work in collaboration whenever possible. However, the investigations are separate and done concurrently. Speaking to a law enforcement officer does NOT obligate a person to initiate the grievance processes outlined in Hinds CC's Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy and/or the Sexual Misconduct Policy.

Preserving Evidence

After an incident of sexual assault or domestic or dating violence, the victim should consider seeking medical attention as soon as possible to make sure they are physically well and to collect evidence, even if the victim chooses not to make a report to law enforcement.

A Sexual Assault Nurse Examination ("SANE") is a medical forensic exam that involves gathering physical evidence from a victim's body, clothing, and other items that may have been used during an assault. Typically, SANE exams are performed at any medical center.

Although it is natural to want to do certain things after an assault, such as take a shower, change clothes, or wash bed linens, whenever possible, a victim should avoid these kinds of actions because they may remove valuable physical evidence. SANE exams can be completed even if a victim has showered, brushed their teeth, douched, or changed clothing, although evidence may be more difficult to obtain. A SANE exam can be completed without filing a police report and is free for the victim.

During a SANE exam medical professionals will also discuss options to reduce the risk of pregnancy and/or sexually transmitted diseases and can address other physical injuries related to an assault. If a victim does not opt for a SANE exam, healthcare providers can still treat injuries and take steps to address concerns of pregnancy and/or sexually transmitted disease at the victim's cost.

Victims are encouraged to preserve evidence by saving text messages, instant messages, social networking pages, and other communications and by keeping pictures, logs, or other copies of documents if they have any that would be useful in an investigation.

Victim's Notification & Support

Victim Notification

Hinds CC will, upon written request, disclose to the alleged victim of a crime of violence or a non-forcible sex offense, the report on the results of any disciplinary proceeding conducted by Hinds CC against a student who is the alleged perpetrator of such a crime or offense. If the alleged victim is deceased as a result of such crime or offense, the next of kin of such victim shall be treated as the alleged victim for purposes of this paragraph.

Supportive and Protective Measures

Protective measures may be available by filing a complaint with law enforcement. For example, police departments may assist with civil protection orders and other measures when criminal complaints are filed. A civil protection order does not require criminal charges to be filed to obtain one. Hinds CC complies with Mississippi laws in recognizing and enforcing orders of protection. An individual who receives an order of protection or a court-ordered "stay-away" should provide a copy of the order to Campus Police and the College Title IX Coordinator. The individual may meet with Campus Police and develop a safety plan to reduce the potential risk of harm while on campus or coming to or going from campus.

Students and employees who report a violation of the Title IX Sexual Harassment Policy and/or the Sex Misconduct Policy will be given notification of their right to receive supportive measures. Supportive measures are non-disciplinary, non-punitive individualized services designed to restore or preserve equal access to Hinds CC's education program or activity, without unreasonably burdening the other party, including measures designed to protect the safety of all parties or Hinds CC's educational environment or deter sexual harassment.

Supportive measures include but are not limited to counseling, extensions of deadlines or other course-related adjustments, modifications of work or class schedules, campus escort services, mutual restrictions on contact between the parties and/or other parties ("no contact orders"), changes in work or housing arrangements, leaves of absence, increased security and monitoring of certain areas of campus, and other similar measures. Individuals who would like to request supportive measures or who experience difficulty obtaining supportive measures that have been approved should contact the Title IX Coordinator.

Subject to other confidentiality provisions outlined in Hinds CC policies, Hinds CC shall maintain as confidential any supportive measures provided to individuals, to the extent that maintaining such confidentiality would not impair the ability of Hinds CC to provide the supportive measures. The College will treat other information shared or received by the involved parties as private and confidential, to the extent permitted under law. Hinds CC will not publish the parties' names or identifying information in the Daily Crime log, Clery Timely Warnings, or online, in compliance with VAWA regulations.

Clery Reportable Crimes

The Clery Act requires universities to report incidences of certain crimes in the ASR. The terms used by the Clery Act are broad and generic as the Clery Act covers all U.S. universities, colleges, and institutes of higher education. Sometimes, a particular state may not have an applicable law that matches the Clery Act reportable crimes list or the specific names mean something else in a different state. The next few sections of this report will help define the Clery Act reportable crimes and the specific and applicable Mississippi statutes so you may better understand what is included in Hinds Community College's Annual Security Report.

Murder or Non-Negligent Manslaughter – Defined as the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another

Manslaughter by Negligence – Defined as the killing of another person through gross negligence

Rape– Penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim

Fondling – Defined as the touching of the private parts of another person for the purposes of sexual gratification without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or because of their temporary or permanent mental incapacity

Incest – Defined as non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law

Statutory Rape – Defined as non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person under the statutory age of consent, which is 16 years of age in Mississippi. If the victim is between 14 and 16 years of age, the suspect must be older than 17 years of age and more than 36 months older than the victim. If the victim is under 14 years of age, the suspect can be of any age if they are more than 24 months older.

Robbery – Defined as taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault – Defined as an unlawful attack by one person upon another to inflict severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury results from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used, which could or probably would result in a serious potential injury if the crime were completed.

Burglary – Unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.

Motor Vehicle Theft – Theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle (Classify as motor vehicle theft in all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access, even though the vehicles are later abandoned, including joyriding.)

Arson – Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

***Hinds CC makes an effort to collect crime statistics from local agencies with jurisdiction around Hinds CC campuses or off-campus locations. When received, those statistics are included where appropriate in this annual report.**



Clery Reportable Crimes

(Continued)

Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Crimes

Domestic Violence – Includes felony or misdemeanor crimes of violence committed by a current or former spouse of the victim, by a person with whom the victim shares a child in common, by a person cohabitating with or who has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner, or by any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected under domestic or family violence laws.

Stalking – Means engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to a) fear for their safety or the safety of others or b) suffer substantial emotional distress. This can include continued unwanted text, call, email, or even 3rd party communication, showing up at the complainant's work, home, school, or public areas they frequent, vandalism to the victim's property, and/or physical menace or injury.

Weapon, Drug and Liquor Law Arrests or Judicial Referrals

The Clery Act also requires institutions to provide statistics for alcohol, drug, and weapons-related arrests or school judicial referrals. These crimes are defined as:

Weapon Law Violations – The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors;

Drug Abuse Violations – Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include opium, cocaine, marijuana, synthetic narcotics, and other dangerous non-narcotic drugs.

Liquor Law Violations – The violation of laws prohibiting the manufacture, transporting, furnishing, sale, or possessing of intoxicating liquor. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

Hate Crimes Reporting

Hinds CC does not tolerate bias-based behavior by any of its employees, faculty, students, staff, contractors, or even patients and visitors. Any bias-based behavior or hate crime report is taken seriously and will be immediately investigated. An incident would be considered a hate crime should one of the following be the basis or motivation for the act:

- Race
- Gender
- Religion
- Sexual orientation
- Ethnicity or national origin
- Disability

The following crimes, when committed because of bias are considered a hate crime and will be investigated as such:

- Simple Assault
- Larceny/Theft
- Intimidation
- Vandalism

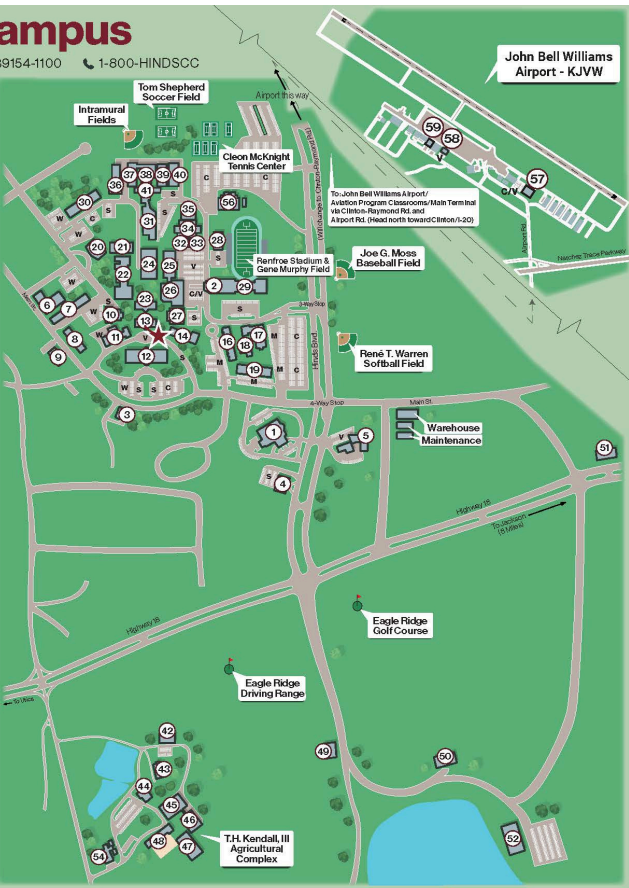

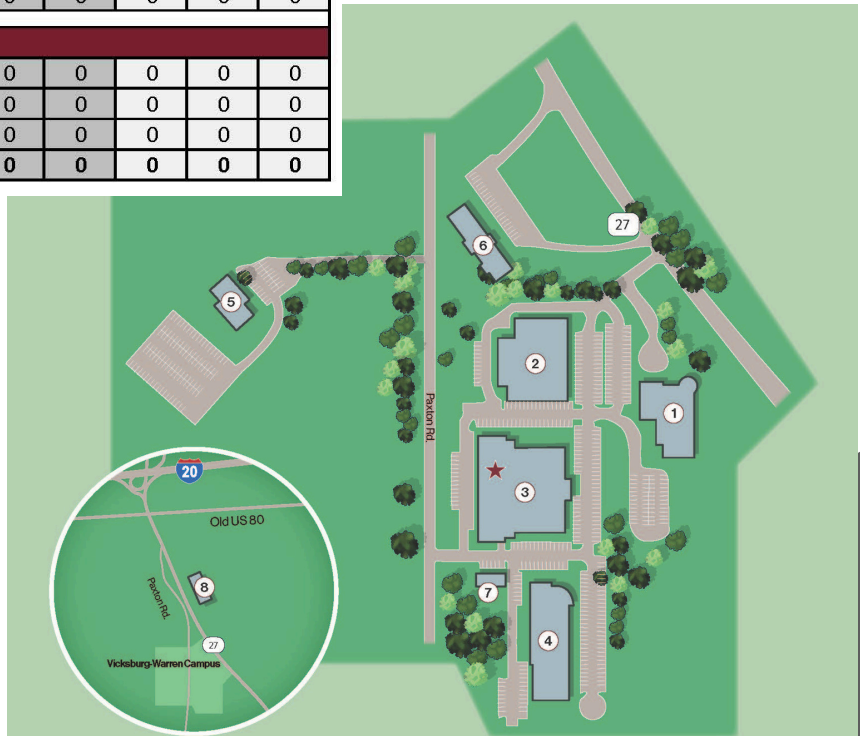

Important Information

DRILLS

Promptly leave the building when the fire alarm sounds.

Follow the instruction of building staff or Campus Police.

Know where your closest exit is. Never use an elevator to exit during a fire or drill.

SAFETY

Report any condition that causes a fire hazard (i.e., trash in corridors/stairwells, missing or damaged fire extinguishers, blocked exits, etc.) to hall staff and Campus Police.

Report all active or extinguished fires to Campus Police.

Know where fire extinguishers are located and learn to use them, if you need training contact Campus Police or the Emergency Operations Manager.

In case of a fire, students and employees should immediately pull the nearest fire alarm pull station, evacuate the building and call Campus PD. Staff should assist in evacuating students and those with disabilities to the predetermined evacuation locations. Students are instructed to immediately exit the building using the nearest stairwell or exit door, avoiding elevators. They should gather at the designated assembly area outside the building and await further instructions from Housing and Residence Life staff or emergency personnel.
